WHAT IS THIS ALL ABOUT?

The Community Climate

Conversations are a chance for South Australians to have a say in how we work together to achieve net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. We want these conversations to be as easy as possible for you to undertake.

Even if you have to skip some questions to fit a conversation into your schedule, we would still love to hear from your group!

Following the conversations, a report on your ideas will be provided to the South Australian Government (in late 2023) to assist in planning to achieve a net zero emissions future. The report will also be provided to businesses, and nongovernment organisations to inform their thinking about actions to respond climate reduce to change and emissions.

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY CONVERSATION

Community conversations form a part of our broader engagement process on achieving net zero. They are made up of a small group of people who get together to talk.

You could conduct a community conversation with a group you are already meeting with. Or you can convene a group specifically for this.

Community Conversations are not about people trying to convince others of a position - they are a chance to capture informed and considered ideas, views and opinions to assist us in transitioning to net zero.

WHAT SHOULD WE TALK ABOUT?

This is an opportunity for your group to raise anything you want to about how we can reduce our emissions and tackle climate change. We have prepared a series of questions for you to work through with your group which you will find in this kit.

To support your conversation a group of 53 randomly selected, diverse South Australians (the Community Climate Panel) have proposed some ideas which you will find in the Conversation Guide (pages 12-25) and are summarised here and on page 11. These are provided to kick start your conversation.

SUBMIT YOU GROUP'S RESPONSE HERE

GETTING READY

WHO SHOULD I INVITE?

We want as many South Australians to contribute as possible - people from all walks of life! We encourage you to invite 6-10 people, who might be different ages or hold different views. Alternatively, you could ask groups that you are already a part of, to have a conversation.

Your group might be people that live in the same place (e.g. a street, building, suburb or town) or share a common interest (e.g. an industry, church, hobby or sport). You might be friends, family, colleagues, school mates, or teammates or you might be strangers brought together to share the conversation.

PREPARING YOURSELF

To prepare for the conversation, we recommend you read The Community Climate Conversation Guide & this Host Kit in detail. This will help you to support your group through the process.

Invite your participants via email. You can find some templates for invitations and communications at the end of this guide. Please feel free to use and edit these to suit your needs.

PREPARING YOUR GROUP

We recommend that you send your group the Community Conversation Guide to preread. This will explain more about emissions reduction and also introduce you to what the Community Climate Panel suggested we focus on. By reading this, your participants will be better prepared to contribute to the conversation.

ORGANISE A TIME AND PLACE

Make sure you have a date and time booked for the conversation.

The location you choose for your conversation is also important to consider. Try and find a place where people are comfortable (e.g. a home, meeting room or a community centre). If you can, organise some drinks and snacks for people.

If your group is spread across your region or even the state, we recommend having your conversation online. There are many online platforms you can use - zoom is free and easy to use.

REMINDERS & SETUP

Send a reminder to your participants with the time and place that you are meeting. Text message works great if you have their numbers!

ON THE DAY

SETUP

Before your group arrives, set up the space to be welcoming and comfortable.

STARTING THE CONVERSATION

You might wish to print pages 6-11 to use during your conversation. We encourage you to start your conversation with an Acknowledgement of Country. A sample of this is included in the Templates section on page 12.

Begin the conversation by introducing the Conversation Guide & ensuring that everyone understands and is comfortable with the task.

WORK THROUGH THE QUESTIONS

Work through the questions recording your group's responses as you go either directly in the online survey or on paper for entering online later. (Please review your answers before you press submit. Make sure you capture the detail as this is important!)

There are 10 questions to consider. As host we encourage you to tackle them as you wish - go where the energy is with your group. If you dont get to some, dont worry - just make sure your responses are as detailed as they can be in the response form.

As a guide we recommend that you break up the conversation into the four blocks below:

- Introductory discussion = 20 minutes
- Your group's priorities = 20-30 minutes
- What's hard to act on = 30-40 minutes
- Wrap-up questions = 10-15 minutes

CLOSE & NEXT STEPS

Thank your group and encourage them to host their own conversation.

Tell them that their input is going direct to the South Australian Government to inform what we do next to reduce emissions.

Please ask your group if they want to stay involved. If they say yes, enter their emails into the form.

As a final fun task, please take a pic of your group on your phone and you can upload it with the survey responses.

REVIEW & SUBMIT

You can enter in responses as you go, or do it later. Please write in what the group said (not what you think they said!) as accurately and clearly as you can.

If you want to enter the responses after the conversation, make sure you make some time for yourself to do that. We recommend to do this no later than 24 hours after the conversation. Please remember to hit submit when you have filled out the survey form.

TIPS FOR HAVING A GREAT CONVERSATION

LOCATION & COMFORT

Choose a time and comfortable location where there will be minimal disruptions – it could be at home, work, in a community space, or even online. Your local council may have spaces that are freely available to use. Pick a time that works for you and your group.

HELPING PEOPLE FEEL WELCOME

Consider using nametags or starting with introductions if people don't know each other.

Breaking the ice early is helpful – get everyone to say something early to get them warmed up for the conversation. This might be introductions, or it might be a short round the table on why they wanted to come along. It could also be answering the first question.

IDENTIFY THE PRIORITIES

No doubt you will have lots of ideas in response to some questions, but we would like you to work with your group to prioritise. What is most important?

KEEP GREAT NOTES

Keep notes or ask someone to keep notes for you of the essence of the things that come up in conversation in response to the questions - to ensure you can reflect this in the response.

HEAR FROM EVERYONE

Make sure that you draw out responses to the questions from the quiet voices in your group e.g. "Mary, what do you think about that question?"

NORMS FOR YOUR GROUP

The ROPES are a great way to support groups to have productive conversations, safely for everyone. As a participant in this conversation we ask that you remember the ropes!

- **R** stands for respect and modelling respect for each other at all times.
 - stands for being open to hearing and learning from others, even if they think differently to you.
 - stands for participating in the conversation actively and fully. We expect everyone to contribute.

D

S

stands for experience. Encourage everyone to share their experiences as relevant.

stands for "share the air". Give others a go!

INTRODUCTORY DISCUSSION

<u>Acknowledgement:</u> We acknowledge the Traditional Owners of the Land on which we are meeting today. We acknowledge the (people) of the (nation) and pay our respects to Elders past and present.

<u>Host note:</u> You might like to start with a quick summary of what this process is all about. Your participants may not have read everything you sent and this will inform or remind them of why you are having a conversation. Some helpful dot points are listed below for this introduction.

- These conversations are a chance for all of us to have a say in how we work together as a State to achieve net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050.
- I will take the notes from our conversation today and enter them into an online form where they will be collated with other conversations, and used to provide a report to the South Australian Government later this year.
- Our responses to the questions form an important part of the bigger picture. They will help government to prioritise their actions, as well as help us as a community to think about how we might act ourselves.
- We will discuss our ideas and decide together what response we want to provide. It's ok if we don't get to all the questions in our time together when I submit the survey, I will skip any unanswered questions.
- To help us kickstart the conversation, the Community Climate Panel (53 independently and randomly selected diverse South Australians) met for 6 workshops earlier this year. The Panel identified six ideas for us to talk about and the actions we would need to take to deliver on these ideas.
- These ideas from the Community Climate Panel are just a starting point. We will probably have other ideas and details to add.

<u>Host note:</u> This first question is intended as a way to get people started on talking about their ideas, and we suggest that you use the 'brainstorming method'. That is, invite each person to contribute one idea, saying that you will record each one, and that we will simply listen to each idea at this stage. They won't be entered in to the survey so only spend 5-10 mins on these questions.

When thinking about reducing emissions to net zero and addressing climate change, what is on your mind?

<u>Host Note:</u> These next 2 questions are to understand what your group thinks the priorities should be. You can ask them in order as below, or in reverse order - it's up to you!

CLIMATE PANEL IDEAS SUMMARY

This list is a summary of ideas which the Community Climate Panel determined. We suggest you print this page for your participants. Your conversation should consider these, as well as others which you might agree as a group are important.

ACCESSIBLE LOW EMISSION PUBLIC TRANSPORT

- Decrease the cost of using public transport, while increasing funding for transport and transport infrastructure.
- · Incentivise public transport use
- Make all types of public transport hydrogen
 or electric

SUSTAINABILITY IN CONSTRUCTION AND INFRASTRUCTURE

- Constantly improve legislation and regulation in the building and planning industries to incorporate the principles of sustainability and net zero emissions
- Provide extensive training in net zero energy design, specification and construction within the building industry.
- Raise consumer awareness, understanding and expectations for energy efficiency and sustainability in the built environment

AGRICULTURAL EMISSIONS

- Using everything we grow
- Incentivising / supporting farmers and agricultural business to transition to lower carbon practices
- Influence consumer decision making

ACCESSIBLE LOW EMISSION PERSONAL TRANSPORT

- Prioritise active transport uptake by addressing safety and access barriers in order to reach our net zero goals
- Increase uptake of clean electric vehicles
- Improved connections between active and public transport to enhance the uptake of both options

ENERGY EFFICIENCY

- Change planning and electrical laws on State and Federal Level to enable residential, commercial and institutional in SA
- Use price incentives to enable adoption
- Workforce development incentivise new, best practice, fund evidence based trials / pilots, educate and train a new sector

CARBON EMISSIONS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

- Trial regulation of emissions of goods and services produced and supplied
- Encourage organisations to produce lowcarbon emission goods and services
- Encourage consumers to purchase lowcarbon emission products/services
